EASY RECIPE FOR CHRISTMAS TREATS KULKULS

■ Bidisha Chowdhury

Ingredients

- 1 pound/1/2 kg all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon cold butter (cubed)
- 2 large eggs
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup coconut milk
- 2 quarts oil (or enough for deep-frying)
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 to 4 tablespoons water

Method

In a bowl, mix the flour and baking powder well. Add the butter a little at a time, mixing gently until the butter is pea-sized. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl and add them to the flour-butter mix. Add the powdered sugar and coconut milk and mix into a soft dough.

Form the dough into small sized balls. Grease the back of a fork with some oil. Flatten the ball of dough and press it onto the back of the fork, forming a rectangle the length of the back of the fork tines. Starting at the bottom end of the fork, roll the dough up the tines and off the fork and into a tight curl. The end result will be a tube-like curl with the ridges from the fork on it. Place the curl on a plate and work the remaining dough similarly until it is all used up. Heat the oil in a deep, heavy-bottomed pan over medium heat. When hot, fry the kulkuls, making

sure to turn them often until they are a light golden brown color. Drain and cool on paper towels. Put the granulated sugar and water in a separate pan and boil until the sugar melts.







Nativity of BVM

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary refers to the birth of Mary by her mother Saint Anne. This feast day is celebrated each year on the eighth of September. Usually, it is the custom of the church to celebrate the feast day of a saint on the date of their death as this is truly their "*die natalis*", the day remembered as their birth into everlasting happiness. Mary, however, entered this world sinless through the privilege of the Immaculate Conception and is the firstborn of the redeemed. Her nativity is a cause for great joy as it is considered the "dawn of our salvation" as Pope Paul VI wrote in the document, *Marialis Cultus* in 1972.

We see every human birth as a call for new hope in the world. The love of two human beings has joined with God in his creative work. The loving parents have shown hope in a world filled with travail. The new child has the potential to be a channel of God's love and peace to the world. This is all true in a magnificent way in Mary. If Jesus is the perfect expression of God's love, Mary is the foreshadowing of that love. If Jesus has brought the fullness of salvation, Mary is its dawning. Birthday celebrations bring happiness to the celebrant as well as to family and friends. Next to the birth of Jesus, Mary's birth offers the greatest possible happiness to the world. Each time we celebrate her birth, we can confidently hope for an increase of peace in our hearts and in the world at large.

It is with this reflection in mind that the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary is celebrated at such a large scale each year. Lakhs of people travel across the world to visit Her shrines and pay homage to Her. Praying the rosary in groups is an important custom on this day. Parishioners of several Churches garland the image of the Blessed Virgin Mary and parade while singing and praying to Her, simultaneously. People bring offerings in the forms of fruits or offer thanksgiving masses too. In some cities, Christians celebrate the feast of Nativity of Mary as an eight-day event. It is a solemn remembrance of the birth of Mother Mary during which believers rigorously participate in fasting, praying and charitable activities for the eight days from September 1 through 8.

This year, however, the celebration of this Feast Day will be held at a much smaller scale due to the unfortunate Corona virus pandemic. It is thereby necessary for all of us to follow social distancing guidelines while celebrating the feast this year.

Here's wishing everyone a very happy Feast of the Nativity of Our Lady!
